Editorially Speaking...

The NJA in this second volume of Newsletter for the Academic Year 2015-16 tabulates graphically response received from participating judges to various academic programmes on pre-training questionnaire formulated to understand the nature of work, difficulties faced at individual jurisdictions, infrastructure support available to individual judges, their opinions on reform agenda and so on. Such graphical analysis helps in presenting large volume of information in fewer words with pictorial deductions making it attractive to read even to those who are extremely busy.

Apart from information collected as response to pre-training questionnaire from judges attending academic programmes, the NJA also separately collects information from the high court registry and the state judicial academies. Such information collected from the past months is also graphically presented for easy reference and further research. For instance, the Directory of 703 POCSO court presiding officers under jurisdiction of 18 high courts is included in this Newsletter. This Directory will facilitate easy communication between these 703 presiding officers and such communication in turn will help in achieving uniform application of laws on prevention of child sexual abuse in the country by POCSO courts. Also, monthly reports submitted to the NJA by 17 state judicial academies (SJA) in pursuant to the Resolution No. 9 and 23 adopted in the Chief Justices' Conference of 2015, provided another set of information which is also graphically represented and in tabular form reproduced. This will provide reader an overall picture about the nature and the number of training activities undertaken at the SJA level in different jurisdictions within India.

Personally, I would like to thank (i) Mr. K. Uthirapathy, Registrar at the NJA who did final proof reading to give third eye view, (ii) Ms. Sangeeta R. Misra, Documentation Manager at the NJA who pointed out linguistic blunders in reports to save us from embarrassment, (iii) Ms. Ruchi Singh, law associate and faculty at the NJA who took pains of following up with other faculty members to get their reports submitted within the deadline prescribed, (iv) Ms. K. Esakki Ammal, law intern who just after joining her internship assignment at the NJA agreed to do graphical and tabular format analysis for response collected from the conference P942.

I also place my appreciation for the entire administration of the NJA whose members support environment conducive for research, training and publication work. Finally, the internship programme is proving successful and the interns whose reports are made part of this newsletter prove that with some mentoring and supervision interns can add to research output by the NJA.



P-937: Conference on Judicial Administration, Response by Judges



The NJA organized 2½ days *Conference on Judicial Administration* for high court justices from August 7-9, 2015. The Conference facilitated discussion on policy level issues in judicial administration to develop greater understanding on bottlenecks faced in performance of courts. A questionnaire was provided to participating justices. Out of 31 participating justices, 15 provided their responses. Herein below information is tabulated from 15 filled responses.


1. On whether there takes place any consultation between registrar(s) and high court justices in budget preparation for the high court and district courts, out of 15 justices, 5 justices from high courts of Himachal Pradesh, Karnataka, Madras and Delhi mentioned that registrars consults them in the budget preparation process, 5 justices from high courts of Karnataka, Calcutta, Orissa and Punjab & Haryana mentioned that registrars do not consult them in budget preparation process, 2 justices from high courts of Madras and Tripura informed that the Committee takes care of budget matters, 2 justices from high courts of Gauhati and Jammu & Kashmir informed that the accounts section deals with the matter. Only 1 justice from high court of Allahabad mentioned that he consults district judges for budget proposals. This leads to an inference that the registry of the high court in budget preparation matters do not consults all high court justices.




2. On whether officers in the high court registry in charge of budget preparation, take in writing, note of demands/ requirements of high court justices, justices from 4 high courts of Jammu & Kashmir, Madras, Delhi, and Andhra Pradesh informed that registry officers take note of their demands/requirements and 8 justices from high court of Gauhati, Himachal Pradesh, Tripura, Allahabad, Karnataka, Calcutta, Orissa, Punjab and Haryana informed in the negative. This further proves that demands and requirements of all high court justices are not taken note of in budget preparation.




3. On whether budget includes earmarking of funds for dealing with issues of pendency and arrears, 9 justices from high courts of Uttarakhand, Gauhati, Tripura, Karnataka, Jammu and Kashmir, Madras, Delhi and Andhra Pradesh gave an affirmative response, 4 justices from high courts of Himachal Pradesh, Allahabad, Calcutta, Punjab and Haryana said they do not know and 2 justices from high courts of Orissa said that budget only includes sanctioned strength of officers and staffs. This leads to inference that budget in the high courts do not include problems areas as variables for quantifying allocation of funds.




4. On whether the high courts have appointed professional accountants as recommended by the National Court Management System Policy and Action Plan, only judges from Madras High Court informed that such appointment has taken place, judges from high court of Jammu and Kashmir informed that such appointment is under consideration. Other 11 justices from the high courts of Uttarakhand, Gauhati, Himachal Pradesh, Tripura, Allahabad, Karnataka, Calcutta, Orissa, Delhi, Punjab and Haryana and Andhra Pradesh informed that there is no proposal in their high courts to engage services of professional accountants.




5. On being asked their opinion on utility of establishing judicial council for budget formation and management to strengthen financial management in the high court, 1 justice from the high court of Uttarakhand did not see any utility, 3 justices from the high courts of Delhi, Punjab & Haryana and Andhra Pradesh were not sure of any such utility and 11 justices from high courts of Gauhati, Himachal Pradesh, Tripura, Allahabad, Karnataka, Jammu & Kashmir, Calcutta, Orrisa, Madras and Delhi saw utility of such council.



6. On whether justices are provided by their registrars human resources to help them in their judicial and administrative work, 2 justices from the high courts of Uttarakhand and Allahabad confirmed that their registrars allocate human resource to them to assist in their judicial and administrative work, 7 justices from the high courts of Gauhati, Himachal Pradesh, Tripura, Karnataka, Orissa, Punjab and Haryana, Andhra Pradesh informed that no such help is rendered by their registrars, whereas 6 justices from the high courts of Jammu & Kashmir, Calcutta, Madras and Delhi informed that such allocation is fixed and extra staff is provided to them on their demand. This leads to an inference that majority of the high court justices do not get adequate human resource support to help them in their administrative and judicial work.




7. On number of e-courts established under their jurisdiction and if they make use of audio-visual conference equipment to monitor progress of e-court project, 11 justices from high courts of Uttarakhand, Gauhati, Himachal Pradesh, Tripura, Allahabad, Karnataka, Jammu & Kashmir, Calcutta, Orissa and Andhra Pradesh mentioned that there is no e-court under their jurisdiction; 2 Justices from high courts of Madras mentioned that there are 21 e-courts in their jurisdiction; 1 Justice from high court of Delhi mentioned about the benches of High Court which are e-courts; 1 Justice from the high court of Punjab & Haryana mentioned having no knowledge of this aspect; 1 justice from high court of Orissa informed that 111 court complexes have been covered under e-courts projects which included 423 courts. But total paperless court as contemplated under the e-court project is yet to be achieved. On use of audio-visual conference equipment to monitor progress of e-courts project, justice from high court of Orissa clarified that he does not use any such audio-visual equipment, 4 justices from high courts of Uttarakhand, Gauhati, Himachal Pradesh and Jammu & Kashmir confirmed that they make use of such equipment to monitor e-court project under them and 10 justices from high courts of Tripura, Allahabad, Karnataka, Calcutta, Orissa, Madras, Delhi, Punjab & Haryana and Andhra Pradesh did not respond to this questions.




8. On number of committees formed for internal administration in High Court and membership of High Court Justices in those committees, following data emerged:

Above data clarifies that though Allahabad high court has constituted highest number of such committees for internal administration of the high court, about 79 in number, the judge attending the NJA conference was member of only 4 of them; whereas Madras high court has constituted 27 such committees for internal administration, one of the justice attending the NJA conference was member of as many as 14 such committees.


9. On whether the job description is provided to every staff employed in the High Court registry, 9 high courts informed that every staff is employed with job description, 3 high courts did not provide any job description and 3 high courts chose not to respond to this query.



11. On whether the staff engaged in inventory/store keeping functions are sent for regular trainings on the subject of procurement provided by the Ministry of Finance, 3 high court judges from Delhi, Punjab & Haryana and Andhra Pradesh expressed no knowledge on the subject and other 12 high court justices from Uttarakhand, Gauhati, Himachal Pradesh, Tripura, Allahabad, Karnataka, Jammu & Kashmir, Calcutta, Orissa, Madras emphatically denied any such training being provided.



12. On calling management experts as consultants to study the high court registry structure and seeking an advice on better methods for organizing existing state of affairs, only justices from Allahabad and Andhra Pradesh provided that their high courts have taken help of management experts to study the structure of the registry.




13. On whether high courts justice came across any redundant procedures which delays court proceedings, justices from Delhi, Andhra Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Himachal Pradesh, Tripura and Calcutta did not respond and justices from Allahabad, Jammu & Kashmir, Orissa, Madras and Punjab & Haryana provided following response:

1	Allahabad	The idea of serving respondents through message on their mobile phone can be an effective and quick mode of service.
3	Jammu & Kashmir	Unnecessary adjournments sought by the counsel delay the process of court proceedings. The counsel in whose favor the interim directions are passed, should be conditionally bound down to serve the other side as early as possible to argue the matter on merit. Only photocopy of the records of trial court should be called in the High Court.
4	Orissa	Non-cooperation of the Bar and unwanted strikes. No Court work after full Court references on demise of Advocates, leaders or former luminaries.
5	Madras (1)	The practice of adjourning cases by a week or two must be discontinued with specific dates being assigned.
6	Madras (2)	The pecuniary jurisdiction of subordinate judiciary may be enhanced to keep the District Court as a final court of fact. The High Court can be given jurisdiction to deal with the cases only on a question of law. The practice of two decrees i.e. preliminary decree and final decree, may be dispensed with. The power of revision to the High Court may be taken away. Certain writs can be given to the District Courts, especially with respect to action or inaction of authorities at the District level.
8	Punjab & Haryana	Most of the cases should be decided at motion stage. Adjournment of cases should be granted very rarely.

15. On *conflict between administrative responsibilities and adjudication work* only Allahabad justice found such conflict. Judges from Tripura, Karnataka and Jammu & Kashmir did not respond to questions and judges from Calcutta, Orissa, Madras, Delhi, Uttarakhand, Gauhati, Himachal Pradesh, Punjab and Haryana and Andhra Pradesh did not find any scope for any such conflict.



Calcutta	Physical verification of case records by which actual pendency of cases at the High Court and District Court level can be ascertained is a best practice.
Orissa	Fruitful results of the engagement of Court Managers.
Madras	Preparation of early budget, implementation of e-courts project despite the project having frozen to less than 800 courts, fully operational vigilance cell empowered by a mechanism with adequate police force to support and its monitoring by a committee of High Court Justices.
Madras	Vigilance cell empowered by a mechanism of police force to support and monitored by Committee in High Court.
Delhi	The superintendence and control over the officers of District Court Judiciary is exercised through Committees rather than by individual Judges. The facilitation of the adjudicatory work through e-Courts.
Andhra Pradesh	The committee system, functioning of Judicial Registry, video conferencing facility in the District Units, SMS mobile application for android devices, MS alerts service system for sending SMS alerts in respect of cases filed in the High Court and for knowing the hearing status of cases for advocates and parties are best practices.

P-942: Workshop on the Court Room Technology, Response by Judges



The NJA organized *Court Room Technology Workshop* from 10th-13th September 2015 to facilitate discussions on technologies used in courtroom procedures in different high courts, postulates of Phase-II of the E-court project, challenges faced by state level computerization committee constituted under the E-court project and so on. The 4 days workshop had six sessions for each day, which included library reading and computer skills training and was attended by 24 justices. Pre-conference questionnaire was prepared and responses were sought from participating justices to understand level of their participation in court computerization project. On the basis of 12 responses received following statistical inferences can be drawn:


1. *On total number of district courts under jurisdiction of each judge, following responses emerged:*




2. *On level of technological developments* justices from the high courts of Andhra Pradesh, Calcutta, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Uttarakhand, Punjab and Haryana informed that they have made huge progress in court computerization whereas justices from the high courts of Gauhati, Himachal Pradesh, Patna and Tripura informed that only some progress is made in their jurisdiction.




3. On total number of district courts computerized under each high court jurisdiction following picture emerged:




4. When asked about the level of infrastructural developments at each high court to support the technological needs, high courts of Andhra Pradesh, Calcutta, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Uttarakhand, Punjab and Haryana informed that more than 80% development has taken place. Whereas high courts of Gauhati, Himachal Pradesh, Patna and Tripura informed that more than 50% infrastructure is already in place to support technological needs.



5. High courts of Andhra Pradesh, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Uttarakhand, Punjab and Haryana informed high level of technological developments at the district courts under their jurisdiction and high courts of Calcutta, Gauhati, Himachal Pradesh, Patna and Tripura informed medium level of technological developments at the district courts under their jurisdiction:




6. As to level of infrastructure developed at district courts to support the technological needs, high courts of Andhra Pradesh, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Uttarakhand, Himachal Pradesh, Tripura, Punjab and Haryana showed high satisfaction with such infrastructure development in district courts under their jurisdiction, whereas high courts of Calcutta and Gauhati were not impressed with such infrastructure developed for their district courts. Patna High Court informed about poor infrastructure to support technological development of district courts under their jurisdiction.




7. On whether their high courts have adopted any software applications for court computerization, most responses were in negative. But on software applications employed for judicial process, high courts informed software is employed for



8. On whether these software or software applications have been developed in-house, high courts of Andhra Pradesh, Calcutta, Gauhati, Himachal Pradesh, Karnataka, Patna and Uttarakhand claimed that their jurisdictions have developed in house these software applications, whereas high courts of Tripura, Jharkhand, Punjab and Haryana informed that no such in-house software is developed in their jurisdiction. Whereas in Jharkhand High Court, NIC (Bangalore) has given the CIS in raw form and it has been customized by Jharkhand High Court (In-house customization).



9. On being asked when these software applications are not developed in-house, then from which other high courts or agencies they sought help from, high court of Jharkhand informed that their high court has taken help from NIC Bangalore, Punjab and Haryana high court informed that their high court is assisted by NIC Delhi in development of software applications, and high court of Uttarakhand informed help taken from NIC & HCL.




11. High courts of Karnataka and Uttarakhand informed that to a great extent their records are digitalized, high courts of Calcutta, Gauhati and Himachal Pradesh mentioned that to a certain extent their records are digitalized, Patna high court responded that digitalization is very less, whereas high courts of Andhra Pradesh, Jharkhand and Tripura mentioned that no such digitalization of records has commenced for their jurisdiction.



On extent of digitalization of library being completed in each jurisdiction, Andhra Pradesh high court informed that digitalization is over to a great extent, high courts of Calcutta, Karnataka and Himachal Pradesh mentioned that to a certain extent digitalization of library is complete, high courts of Gauhati and Tripura informed about slow progress in this record, whereas high courts of Jharkhand, Patna and Uttarakhand informed that no such digitalization of library has commenced in their jurisdiction.










16. On being asked about computer network security provider for each jurisdiction, high courts of Andhra Pradesh, Himachal Pradesh, Jharkhand, Patna, Tripura and Uttarakhand informed that NIC provides them such network security, Calcutta and Gauhati high court informed about symantec endpoint protection providing them such network security and Karnataka high court mentioned squid proxy-Whats up GOLD providing them such network security.



17. On whether e-filing has started in their jurisdiction, high courts of Punjab and Haryana informed it has, Calcutta and Himachal Pradesh high courts informed that framing of rules is in the process in Calcutta High court and in Himachal Pradesh the matter has already been taken with the government of Himachal Pradesh for introducing the e-stamp and e-court fee in High Court of Himachal Pradesh and district courts chucker, Shimla for a period of three months on a trial basis. The government of Himachal Pradesh has already amended Himachal Pradesh court fee act and is in the process of amending the relevant rules and also entering into an agreement with M/s stockholding Corporation of India Ltd. The system of the e-stamping and e-court

fee shall be introduced as precursor to e-filing with a view to introduce e-filing in the High Court of Himachal Pradesh. The CPC of Himachal Pradesh High Court as well as the scientific Officer, NIC unit Himachal Pradesh High Court has already studied the e-filing module of Delhi High Court and the process: e-filing will be initiated in the High Court of Himachal Pradesh in due course of time. Further *high courts of Andhra Pradesh, Gauhati, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Uttarakhand, Tripura and Patna* informed that in their jurisdiction e-filing has not started.






P-944: Workshop on the Use of Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) System, Response by Judges



The NJA organized a 3 days workshop on the *Use of Alternative Dispute Resolution System* for the Principal District Judges (PDJs) from 21st to 23rd September 2015 at the NJA, Bhopal. About 29 PDJs from across the country attended the workshop. A pre-workshop questionnaire was sent to them to seek their responses. 1. *As a Referral Judge, which mode of dispute resolution you prefer most to refer a dispute under section 89 of the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908?*





- Mentality and goal of parties to solve the problem.

- Less expensive and simple procedure.
- Parties are free to discuss their differences of opinion without disclosure of facts before any courts.
- Parties are directly and actively involved.
- Understanding the utility of the process by clients/lawyers.
- Expertise and experience of mediator.
- Reducing the number of cases.
- Judge can devote themselves in disposing serious cases.
- Participation of all in dispute resolution.
- Litigation should not be dragged for indefinite period by taking advantage of technicalities of legal procedure.

Solutions suggested


- Identification of judges as mediators who have acumen and willingness to dedicate for the cause and giving them opportunity to concentrate on mediation more than working on judicial side.
- Training for lawyers like seminar workshop etc at district level.
- Holding workshop at college level, village level and awareness.
- Regular training of the mediators and distribution of some prize or appreciation letter for doing well in mediation.
- Reduce paper work.
- ADR methods can be discussed by experts on radio/television.
- Awareness among lawyers, parties, judges about the benefits of the ADR process.
- Government support.
- Legal training and awareness to advocate, judicial officers and also ADR staff.
- Pre litigation mediation should be encouraged with full pace.
- Training to all judicial officers and separate staff be recruited for mediation center.
- Hospitality and other contingencies powers for expenditure be given to coordinator of mediation center.
- Public awareness about ADR through visual and audio media.
- There is scope to develop rules and procedure regarding "Judicial Settlement"
- Referral of cases to be made effective as per direction of the Hon'ble Supreme Court in Afcon case.
- Pool of experts for various ADR systems has to be enhanced and diversified.
- Permanent staff should be appointed.
- Salary should be increased.
- More retired judicial officers should be allowed in ADR system.
- Taking this system to all stake holders vigorously without affecting main stream judicial process and adjudication mechanism.
- Role of advocate, panel lawyers.
- Framing of a uniform statutory law.
- Judicial officers should be posted for searching for proper records to be sent for mediation after discussion with parties and their lawyers.
- Members of the bar should be sensitized.
- General awareness among litigants.

P-947: Seminar on Sentencing Ethics, Response by Judges



The NJA organised a 3 days seminar on *Sentencing Ethics* for the Principal District and Sessions Judges (PDJs) from 02nd to 04th October 2015 to assist them in developing uniform practices and approaches on issues of sentence. 27 PDJs attended this seminar. A pre-seminar questionnaire was circulated to evaluate grounds relied upon while sentencing a convict. 25 PDJs provided their responses and herein below graphical representation of those response is provided:


- On relevant factors for awarding the death sentence, the response reflects inclination of judges to rely on antecedents of the accused and the circumstances surrounding accused.




- On facts and circumstances to be taken into account by a judge to award life term to the convict of capital offence under Section 302 of the Indian Penal Code, majority of them, 19 out of 25 stated that they would be relying on criminal antecedents for the accused.




3. On relevant factors considered to award death sentence to the woman convict, majority of them opined that they would consider the nature of offence committed, its gravity as relevant factor.




4. On question about which relevant factors are to be taken into account to sentence a woman convict to life imprisonment in a case of murder under section 302 of the Indian Penal Code, majority of judges again said that they would rely on nature of offence committed and only 10 out of 25 said that they would keep gender of accused as consideration when deciding on sentencing issues.




5. On relevant factors judges would consider to award *life imprisonment in sexual offences against children*, again majority of judges stated that they would look into past records of the convict.














P-951: Seminar on Employment Laws and Judicial Practice, Response by Judges

The NJA, Bhopal organized a 4-days Seminar on Employment Laws and Judicial Practice from 28th to 30th October 2015 to address issues of contract labour, social security measures, outsourced labour, unfair labour practices, domestic inquiry and need of striking balance between the interest of employee and employer. It was attended by 25 presiding officers of Labour Court/Industrial Tribunals. A pre training questionnaire consisting of 22 informative, subjective, and evaluative questions seeking organizational and functional details and operational problems was sent to all. The NJA received 26 responses. On the basis of these responses, graphical and deductive observations are made herein below.

1. *On number of Labour Courts and Industrial Tribunals established in the respective State/within the jurisdiction of High Court*



With the help of chart-1 drawn above one can infer that the highest number of Labour Courts and Industrial Tribunals are constituted in the State of Maharashtra. A total of 102 (66 LC+ 36 IT) industrial adjudication machineries are set up in Maharashtra followed by the State of Gujarat which has 60 (16+44) industrial and employment redressal forums. Also Gujarat has highest number of Industrial Tribunal (44). Further some of the most industrialized States of India (after Maharashtra and Gujarat) like Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Punjab, West Bengal, and Karnataka have comparatively very few industrial and employment redressal forums.

2. *On composition (adequacy of staff) of Labour Court and Industrial Tribunal*





Chart 2 above provides that out of 26 responses, 14 presiding officers expressed that there are adequate number of supporting staff in their forum, whereas 12 participants expressed that they are facing the problem of inadequate or untrained staff.

3. *On ICT infrastructure available at Labour Court and Industrial Tribunal*



13 responses pointed out that their Labour Court/Industrial Tribunal is enabled with ICT infrastructure and remaining 13 judges expressed about lack of ICT infrastructure as shown in Chart-3 above.

4. *On availability of (IT) trained Staff*





Chart-4 shows that out of 26, only 7 stated that their Labour Court/Industrial Tribunal are facilitated with IT Trained Staff, whereas 13 stated lack of trained staff in their respective Labour Court or Industrial Tribunal. Remaining 6 participants did not respond to the question.

5. *On frequency of taking assistance of Assessors in resolving Industrial/employment disputes by Labour Court/Industrial Tribunal*




Industrial Dispute Act, 1947 authorizes a Labour Court, Tribunal or National Tribunal to appoint one or more persons having special knowledge of the matter under consideration before such Labour Court/Tribunal. Assessors partakes an important role in industrial adjudication and as an expert in the respective field s/he assist the adjudicatory body in correct assessment of fact or in suggesting right remedies (though of persuasive value) in the given situation. Accordingly, Presiding Officer may take the advice of assessors as and when required. Chart-5 shows that majority (18 responses) did not seek the advice of assessors, and only 4 responses shows that they *rarely* takes the assistance of assessors.

6. *On approximate number of cases pending before Labour Court/Industrial Tribunal*

Chart-7 shows that, average number of cases pending before the labour judiciary are generally more than 200 but less than 500. Out 26 judges, 13 had number of pending cases between 201-500. About 5 had cases pending before them between 1001-2000, and 2 had cases pending before them below 1000 but more than 501. Also 2 judges had pending cases before them less than 200 but more than 100. Lastly, 4 judges indicating that the number of cases pending are 50>, 51-100, 101-200 and <3000.

7. On average number of adjournments taken at 'pleadings stage' before Labour Court or Industrial Tribunal






Chart-7 shows that out of 26, 10 judges stated that average number of adjournment at pleadings stage is more than 5, another 9 judges stated that pleadings stage takes on an average 3 adjournments, 3 other judges affirmed that 4 adjournments are needed at pleadings stage, another 2 judges opined that pleadings stage needs on an average of 5 adjournments. Therefore we can infer that at the pleadings stage, generally more than 5 adjournments are taken.

8. On average number of adjournment taken at 'Evidence Stage'



Out of 26 responses, 10 judges indicated that the Evidence Stage of the case takes more than 6 adjournments, 8 judges responded that on an average evidence appreciation stage takes 4 adjournments, about 5 judges responses recorded that it takes 5 adjournments and the remaining 3 judges noted that on an average evidence appreciation in an Industrial Disputes takes 6 adjournments.

9. Reasons for adjournment in labour matters



Adjournment in labour matters is mostly due to carelessness of parties, followed by difficulty of parties or difficulty of legal representatives of parties as inferred from the 26 responses received from participant presiding officers of Labour Courts. Apart from these, some of the other reasons for adjournment as specifically mentioned by the participants were, lack of effective representation of workmen in majority of cases, non-observance of time frame fixed for adjudication and lesser number of courts in some places.

10. Factors affecting time length of a labour dispute proceeding in labour court/industrial tribunal





Chart-10 shows the factors affecting the time taken to decide a dispute. 12 out of 26 responses stated that the duration of proceedings mostly depends on collection and recording of evidence, followed by procedural requirements and the efficiency of parties in filing the pleadings. The presiding officer's efficiency in law is another factor effecting the duration of a proceeding in Labour Court or Industrial Tribunal.


11. Average number of hearings required to decide an industrial dispute

Chart 11 shows that out of 26 judges, 9 pointed out that adjudicatory process takes about 10 to 15 hearings, 8 stated 15 to 20 hearings on an average and 3 stated that it take more than 25 hearings to decide an industrial dispute depending on the factors mentioned in Chart-10 (above).




12. Application of Unit system to labour Judiciary

On question whether they are supposed to adhere to the unit system, Calcutta, Kerala, Patna, Jharkhand and Uttarakhand stated that they need not to adhere to the unit system whereas remaining from 9 High Courts follow the Unit system.




13. Right to Legal Representation/Aid of a workmen by an Advocate

In the absence of Supreme Court Judgment on legal representation by an advocate, whether the employees by virtue of constitutional provisions and Legal Services Authorities Act, 1987 entitled for Legal representation/aid, even though the ID Act 1947 debars such right without consent of other party. Out of 25 responses, 17 responded affirmatively by stating employees are entitled to legal representation whereas 8 of them said no that such right is not available as barred by the Industrial Disputes Act 1947.



14. Whether consent of the other party for availing legal representation under Sec. 34(4) of ID Act 1947 can be implied, oral or it must be in written form

According to Sec 34(4) of the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 consent of the other party is required for legal representation. On the question whether such consent should be oral written or implied/ inferred from the conduct of the parties, 17 presiding officers opined that consent can be implied or inferred from the conduct of the parties as represented in Chart-14.




Participants also made certain suggestions for making the Labour Courts and Industrial Tribunal more efficient. The suggestions included good infrastructure, skilled and trained IT staff to be provided to Labour courts and industrial tribunal, proper library, training to the presiding officers in regular intervals to acquaint them with recent developments, fixed tenure for presiding officers of Labour Courts/ Industrial Tribunal and no gap in posting the PO, strict observance of time schedule fixed for adjudication, proper legal representation and aid to parties and execution power of the award must be conferred on the Labour Courts and Tribunals.

P-952: Workshop on Development of Innovative Pedagogies for Delivery of Judicial Trainings, Response by the SJAs




The NJA Bhopal organized a 5 days workshop on *Development of Innovative Pedagogies for Delivery of Training* for Directors and Faculty members of the State Judicial Academies (SJAs) from 1st to 5th November 2015 to explore new methods of delivery of trainings for maximum transfer of learning amongst adults. The programme was attended by 19 Directors and Faculty members of the SJAs. 

P-953: Conference on Judicial Ethics and Accountability, Responses by Judges

The NJA organized a 3 days *conference on Judicial Ethics and Accountability* from 6th to 8th November, 2015 for high court judges on various dimensions of ethical principles and standards of accountability provided in Bangalore Principles, Nolan Principles of public life and in the Restatement of Values of Judicial Life. To prepare for the conference, a questionnaire was sent to the Registrar Generals of all 24 high courts on nature and level of compromise of ethical values by judicial officers. Out of 24, the NJA received 14 responses. These are reproduced graphically below to understand national picture:


1. *Officers removed during probation*



As shown above, maximum number of judicial officers, about 14 of them, were removed during probation, from Allahabad high court. These 14 probationary judicial officers from Allahabad high court were dismissed from service on grounds of scuffle between them at a local restaurant. 
2. *Judicial officers given compulsory retirement*

- Misconduct


3. *Judicial officers suspended from service*





From Patna High Court 5 officers have been kept under scanner for a specific period the reasons being:

- Alleged involvement in criminal case
- On the basis of adverse entries in the Annual confidential report


Madras high court has 3 officers kept under scanner on charges of corruption and other allegations. From Guwahati high court one officer has been kept under scanner on the allegations of corruption. The reasons given by Kerala high court are anomalies noted in inspection report by the Registrar (Vigilance), allegation that the officer performs duty under the influence of alcohol and gives favourable orders to young lady advocates.



P-955 : Conference on Judging and Judicial Method, Response by Judges



The NJA organized a 4 days *conference on Judging and Judicial Method for Newly Elevated High Court Judges* from 19th to 22nd November 2015. A preconference questionnaire centered on the thematic areas covered in the conference was sent to all the nominated justices of the high courts to seek their responses. Following is graphical representation of the responses received from all the 18 high court justices.


1. *On extent to which continuing technological, cultural, environmental and economic changes (both national and international) have rendered the landscape of judging even more complex*, out of the 18 justices, 15 justices from high courts of Allahabad (02 justices), Andhra Pradesh (02 justices), Karnataka, Calcutta (02 justices), Guwahati, Jammu & Kashmir, Jharkhand, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Orissa, Punjab & Haryana, Sikkim were of the opinion that only to a certain extent continuing technological, cultural, environmental and economic changes, both at national and international level have rendered the landscape of judging even more complex. While 03 justices from high courts of Delhi (02 justices) and Karnataka opined that for them to a great extent such changes have rendered the landscape of judging even more complex.




2. *Regarding average number of precedents considered in deciding a case* out of the 18 justices, 13 justices from high courts of Allahabad, Calcutta, Guwahati, Jammu & Kashmir, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Orissa and Punjab & Haryana said that they consider one to five precedents on an average in deciding a case, 1 justice from the high court of Andhra Pradesh said he considers six to ten precedents in deciding a case, while 4 justices from high courts of Andhra Pradesh, Delhi and Sikkim said that it depends from case to case before them.




3. *On whether guidelines and instructions should be provided on how to use precedents in adjudication of cases*, out of the 18 justices, 6 justices from high courts of Allahabad, Calcutta, Guwahati, Jharkhand, Madhya Pradesh agreed and another 3 justices from the high courts of Delhi and Orissa strongly agreed with the idea of guidelines and instructions to be provided to judges on how to use precedents in the adjudication of cases, while 6 justices from high courts of Calcutta, Jammu & Kashmir, and Karnataka, Kerala and Sikkim did not express any view, whereas, 3 justices from high courts of Andhra Pradesh, and Punjab & Haryana disagreed on the idea of such guidelines on how to use precedents in the adjudication of cases.




4. *On whether trainings on the use of precedents could be organized for judges at all levels*, 11 justices from high courts of Allahabad, Andhra Pradesh, Calcutta, Guwahati, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh agreed, 3 justices from high courts Delhi and Orissa strongly demanded for some trainings on the use of precedents at all levels, 2 justices from high courts of Jammu & Kashmir and Sikkim did not express any view and 2 justices from high courts of Andhra Pradesh and Punjab & Haryana disagreed on need for such trainings.




5. *On what should a judge do when, personal experience, reflections or research indicates that there is a better argument than any of those actually presented to the court by the parties*, out of the 18 justices, 10 justices from high courts of Allahabad, Andhra Pradesh, Calcutta, Guwahati, Jammu & Kashmir, Karnataka, Orissa, Punjab & Haryana responded that a judge should advise lawyers for reframing the issues, 5 justices from high courts of Calcutta, Jharkhand, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh and Sikkim were of the view that a judge should not suggest anything and 3 justices from high courts of Andhra Pradesh and Delhi felt that a judge can suggest amicus curiae in such a situation.




6. *On extent to which social context adjudication is an indispensable tool of judging in constitutional courts*, out of the 18 justices, 11 justice from high courts of Allahabad, Andhra Pradesh, Calcutta, Guwahati, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Punjab & Haryana opined that to a certain extent, social context adjudication is an indispensable tool of judging in constitutional courts, while 6 justices from high courts of Delhi, Jammu & Kashmir, Karnataka, Kerala and Orissa opined it indispensable to a great extent and 1 justice from high courts of Sikkim felt that, to a lesser extent only social context adjudication is an indispensable tool of judging in constitutional courts.



7. *Regarding importance of objectivity in decision making process*, out of the 18 justices, 10 justices from high courts of Andhra Pradesh, Delhi, Guwahati, Jammu & Kashmir, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Orissa, Sikkim felt rated objectivity as very important, 7 justices from the high courts of Allahabad, Andhra Pradesh, Calcutta, Karnataka and Punjab & Haryana rated objectivity in decision making process as important, and 1 justice from high court of Kerala rated objectivity in decision making process as less important.




8. *On extent to which it is important for a judge to understand the nature of diversity and the socio-cultural issues*, 9 justices from the high court of Allahabad, Andhra Pradesh, Calcutta, Guwahati, Karnataka, Kerala, Punjab & Haryana, Sikkim were of the opinion that to a certain extent, it is important for a judge to understand the nature of diversity and the socio-cultural issues that shape the persons who appear before them, while 7 justices from high court of Allahabad, Calcutta, Jammu & Kashmir, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh and Orissa felt it is important to a great extent. However, 2 justices from high court of Delhi did not feel that it to be important at all for a judge in decision making process.





■ Great extent ■ To certain extent














Pursuant to the “Chief Justices Conference 2015” resolution No. 9 and No. 23, the NJA is provided item-wise monthly progress report from all the State Judicial Academies (SJAs) for being submitted to the Hon’ble Supreme Court of India. In furtherance to these resolutions, 17 SJAs have sent their monthly progress reports out of 23 SJAs functional in India. The following picture emerges from monthly reports submitted so far:

1. Number of programs conducted by various SJAs




The chart above reflects the number of programs conducted by the respective state judicial academy from January to November 2015. Maximum programs were conducted by Delhi Judicial Academy followed by Jammu & Kashmir and Madhya Pradesh State Judicial Academy.

2. *Nature of programs conducted by SJAs*




Out of the 287 training programs conducted by 17 State Judicial Academies from January to November 2015 a total of 77 programs were judicial training programs, 54 programs were refresher courses, 41 programs were non-judicial trainings, 33 programs were Ubuntu training programs, 27 programs were orientation/foundation courses, 27 programs were seminars & workshops, 8 programs were conferences, 6 sensitization programs were conducted, 3 skill enhancement & management programs and 3 programs for judicial and non-judicial trainings conducted jointly.

3. *Nature of participants to the programs conducted*




Out of the 287 number of programs conducted by 17 SJAs, 68% participants were only judicial officers, 19% participants were administrative officers & court staff, 8% participants were advocates & prosecutors while 5% participants to the programs were judges along with registrars, police officers, CWC members etc.

4. *Nature of Resource Persons to the programs conducted*



Out of the 287 number of programs conducted by 17 SJAs, 36% resource persons were judges and presiding officers, 20% resource persons were secretaries and senior officials of commissions and various other depart., 16% resource persons were academicians, 13% resource persons were directors and faculty members of SJAs/visiting faculty, 5% resource persons were experts, another 5% resource persons were advocates and prosecutors, 4% resource persons were master trainers, 1% resource persons were soft skill trainers, whereas 1% of the resource persons were administrative staff of courts and others .

5. *Improvement in Training Infrastructure*



Out of the 17 State Judicial Academies who have given the item-wise monthly reports, 16 SJAs provided information regarding the improvement in infrastructure. Among them 6 SJAs mentioned about improvement in all the three infrastructures that is, human, physical and knowledge, 4 SJAs mentioned about improvement in only knowledge infrastructure, 3 SJAs mentioned about improvements in both human & physical infrastructure. While 1 SJA mentioned about improvements in both physical and knowledge infrastructures, another 1 SJA mentioned about improvement in both human and knowledge infrastructures, whereas as 1 SJA mentioned about improvement in only physical infrastructure.

National Judicial Academy

Conceived in early 1990s by the Supreme Court of India, the NJA had to wait nearly a decade to get its infrastructure in place. On September 5, 2002 the then President of India, Dr. A.P.J. Abdul Kalam, formally dedicated to the Nation, the beautiful sprawling complex of the NJA, spread over 62 acre campus overlooking the Upper Lake at Bhopal. The President on the occasion released a Second Vision for the Republic in which a new and dynamic role for the judiciary was envisaged with a view to make India a developed country by 2020. “*The Academy*”, he said, “*may aim at developing attitudinal changes to improve judicial integrity and efficiencies*”. The NJA is now ready to commence that rather challenging journey towards achieving higher standards of excellence in delivery of justice through human resource development and techno-managerial upgradation.

Registered as a Society in 1993 under the Societies Registration Act (1860), the NJA is managed by Governing Council chaired by the Chief Justice of India. The Governing Council consists of two senior most Judges of the Supreme Court of India and three Secretaries to the Government of India from the Departments of Law and Justice, Finance and Legal Affairs. The mandate of the Academy under the Memorandum of the Society include following objectives:

- (i) to establish a center of excellence in the study, research and training of court management and administration of justice and to suggest improvements to the judicial system;
- (ii) to provide training and continuing legal education to judicial officers and ministerial officers of the courts; and
- (iii) to disseminate information relating to judicial administration, publish research papers, books, monographs, journals etc. and collaborate with other institutions both within the country and abroad.

With the support and guidance of the justices of the Hon’ble Supreme Court of India, the NJA has launched an ambitious plan of research, education and training activities to give the judiciary - the required intellectual inputs to assist the judicial system in dispensation of quality and responsive justice.
